The American National Bank of Atlanta


It should come as no surprise that
Atlanta was home to the most National Banks
in all of Georgia. Our capital city took claim to
twelve different banks during the National
Bank Note period from 1863 to 1935, ten of
which issued and circulated currency. The
success, longevity, and number of Nationals
issued between those ten banks greatly



differed. For example, the most prominent Atlanta issuer was undoubtedly CH# 1559, The Atlanta National Bank. This Fulton County bank opened their doors for business in September of 1865 and survived until the 1990s, issuing a whopping total of over 3.7 million National Bank Notes, with close to 700 of those notes surviving today. Now, compare this to CH# 5490, The

GEORGIA PLACER GOLD

Starting in the 1970s, J. Gordon Farmer, and avid colletor of Dahlonega gold coins, began mining for gold in Lincolnton, GA, a little southeast of the Dahlonega area. By the late 1980s, Farmer's mining had produced over 200 ounces of gold. These nuggets and dust are a tangible link to the storied gold coins struck at the mint in Dahlonega, Georgia.



Charter 9105, The American National Bank of Atlanta, began its life when it opened up for business on April 15, 1908. The bank formed when the Maddox-Rucker Banking Company officially declared their conversion from a state institution to a National Bank

charter. Virtually no interruption of the business of the bank was needed, as the bank officers remained the exact same once the conversion was completed. Those bank officers remained in their respective positions until The American National Bank met its demise. Sitting at the top of CH# 9105 was President William Lawson Peel (1849-1927), a native of Americus, Ga who came to Atlanta at an early age to enter the business of banking. Serving as Vice-President was the well-known Robert Foster Maddox (1870-1965) who, during his term as Vice-President, also served as the Mayor of Atlanta from 1909-1911. The Harvard graduate's father, Colonel Robert Flournoy Maddox, was an early Atlanta settler/pioneer and war hero. The last of the bank officer trifecta was Cashier Thomas Jackson Peeples (1863-1938). Prior to his time in the banking business, Peeples acted as Atlanta's very first night telephone operator.

As previously mentioned, the banking competition in Atlanta was nothing short of challenging, particularly with The Atlanta National Bank, who was the oldest National Bank in the Cotton States. The challenge officially came to an end on December 2, 1916, when The Atlanta



National Bank purchased The American National Bank outright. With the transaction, Atlanta was now home to the largest bank in the southeastern United States. As a result of the liquidation of their bank, President Peel

Recently obtained 1902 \$10 Date Back

Did you know... that you now have to sort your silver coin differently starting in 2019? We all know that the U.S. Mint stopped making 90% silver coin for circulation dated 1964. For most of the Mint's history, silver dimes quarters and halves were 90% silver and a dollars' face value of these silver coin contained .723 ounces of silver. During this time the Silver Dollars contained 5% more, at .773 ounces of silver. After 1964 the Mint has done a number of different silver issues, with all coins the same fineness and weight. These were usually special sets or commemorative coin programs. Many of these silver-containing sets have been broken up over the years, and the post 1964 silver coin often gets mixed in with the pre-1965 coin since he fineness and weight is the same. Well, there's a bump in the road to be aware of. The Mint spent 2018 notifying the coin collecting community that there was a change coming. Beginning in 2019, the Mint was switching over to .999 fine silver blanks for all of its' future silver issues because the pure silver blanks were less expensive to order than the 90% blanks, which were more expensive because of the time and effort to create the blended metals. So, through 2018 for your 90% silver coin, \$1 face value of dimes, quarters and halves contained .723 ounces of silver when new. Silver Dollars of this period were .773 ounces of silver. Beginning in 2019 for the NEW silver coin, \$1 face value of the new .999 pure silver coins contains .8157 ounces of silver and silver dollars contain .858 ounces. So, best to start sorting silver that you are selling by purity. Otherwise, you may be selling yourself short...

<u>Did you know</u>... that the new US Mint subscription program had a positive effect on the sales of the 2023 Morgan/Peace silver Dollar release? The US Mint first released the 100th anniversary of Morgan and Peace Dollars in 2021, and it was a disaster. With a maximum of 10 coins per household, Website crash, computers being locked out, then competition from speculators and robotic ordering programs left unchecked, the Mint embarrassed itself (again), resulting in angry collectors and ecstatic speculators. The Mint paused the program a couple of weeks, lowered issue limits, and the second and third releases were almost as bad. One of my favorite old sayings is "the lessons we learn hardest we learn best". The Mint apparently learned from its 2021 mistakes. After taking the program off line for 2022 to work things out, the Mint reintroduced the program with much more success the 2nd time around.

retired after 40 years as a banker in Atlanta, Vice President Maddox was promoted to President of The Atlanta National Bank, and Cashier Peeples became the new Vice President.

What about the National Bank Notes that The American National Bank issued? Over the course of the bank's eight-year life, both 1902 Series Red Seals and Date Backs were issued. A little over 10,000 sheets of \$5 and \$10 Red Seals and 115,000 sheets of \$5 and \$10 Date Backs were issued altogether. Those notes saw a very high redemption rate; however, less than two dozen examples are reported to have survived the

preserved and lightly circulated example that is home to bold signatures of Cashier Peeples and President Peel. Perhaps, my favorite attribute of this great note is the highly unusual and seldom seen layout utilized, making for a pleasing to the eye appearance, and a great National note all-in-all.

For 2023, any interested collectors could preorder up to 3 of each of the 5 options being offered. Then later on, the Mint increased this number to 10 per order as initial orders were on the low side and even later increased the number to 25 of each option. This program allowed all of the collectors following the Mint issues to order what they wanted, at issue prices. This killed any potential secondary market for the speculators. Everyone that wanted a coin(s) got one. Win for the collector, maybe neutral for the Mint (that is expected to sell through the product, only taking longer) and definitely a negative for the speculators that found no secondary market to speak of, dramatically different than with the 2021 issues. I've got to give the Mint the credit it deserves for getting it RIGHT! At the time of writing this article (9/11/23), the Uncirculated Morgan and Peace Dollars, mintage 275K each, released July 13th for \$76 each are sold out. The Proof Morgan and Peace Dollars released August 9 for \$80 each with a mintage of 400K each are still available from the Mint. Hopefully they will continue to "get it right" and make decisions that benefit their collector base rather than the speculators abusing the system. Time will tell...
